

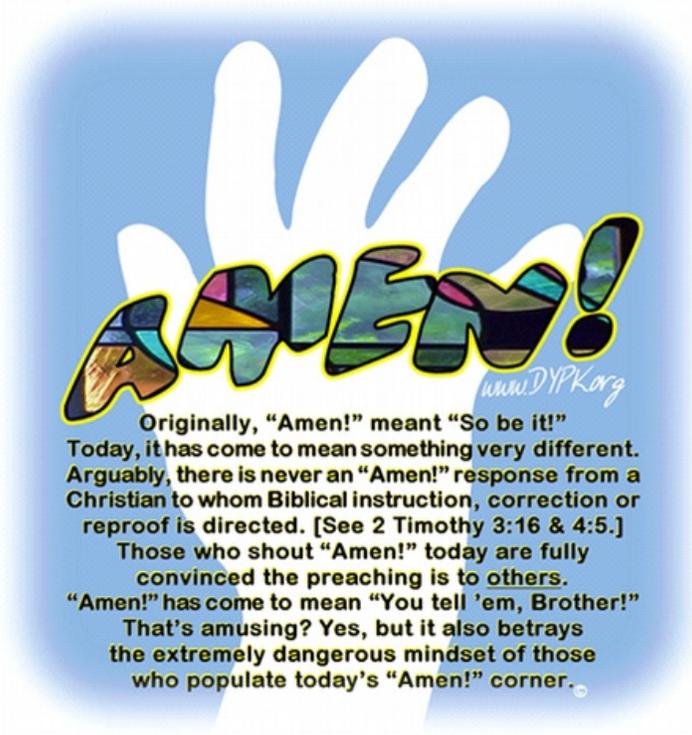


The Research PROCESS

 2. Separation of Doctrinal Biases from Objective Scriptural Comprehension
- VII. Team Leader/Scribe Writes Final Draft of Literature for Publication
 - A. If there is team consensus, that may or may not be noted.
 - B. Where there is no consensus on the team leader's conclusions and presentation, team members acknowledge that even King James' translators couldn't have agreed on every translation decision.
 - C. Because there cannot (and probably should not) be consensus on every scriptural conclusion or decision, only the organizational name(s) and the name of the team leader/scribe are published.
 - D. Membership on the research team in no way requires or implies concurrence with every conclusion or decision regarding organizational publications.
 1. Much of value can be (and has been) learned from disagreement—even internal disagreement.
 2. As an organization we resolve to avoid a rigid, church-styled "what 'we' believe" platform.
 3. The essence of our organizational Mission Statement is "to prompt people to re-examine and scrutinize what they've been taught about the Bible and Christianity." That is a process. We must each follow it, too. If we do, then some of our scriptural views will *necessarily* change, over time, as we gain more and more of Original Truth.
 4. From the beginning, we have known – and advertised – that we may never agree on *everything* Biblical. In Christendom, that mindset may be unique. It is certainly healthy: If a contributing research team member wishes not to be identified with a published conclusion or observation, he/she will find no difficulty in remaining completely anonymous. "Where all think alike, few think."
